From the boat we could see the sharks attacking the bait – large fish heads.




Several bore significant scars from fights and got nearly close enough to touch.






Regulators fed air from a compressor above. I dived as long as three hours straight.






As seen in the recent video, the bars are far enough apart so that smaller sharks might get in. (Smaller as in 8-10 feet in length)




















Sharks are attracted to the area for the abundance of sea lions and seals






That is a tiny drone with GoPro camera
